After the disappointment of relegation in 2022, the 1st XI bounced back to the Premier division after securing the runners up spot to eventual winners Banstead. Well done to Sam and the squad. It was pleasing to achieve promotion without an overseas player and in fielding a side that on average contained six home grown players per game and in one game eight, continuing the policy of promoting and developing our in house talent .The 2s and 3s were challenging for promotion until the final weeks of the season but in the end fell short. Thanks again to Jamie who assures me this time he is definitely standing down as 2s Captain in 2024. Balajee, the master tactician (especially where bringing himself on to bowl is concerned) led the 3s in a spirited challenge for promotion that in the end wasn't to be - I'm certain the 3s will be in contention for promotion in 2024. The 4th XI finished mid table and considering the level of injuries

and cry offs in the teams above this was something of an achievement, Sam Longstone is not standing as Captain for 2024. Sam thanks for your contribution. The Women's XI were promoted to the SWCL Premiership as champions - well done to Eleanor and the squad. Highlights were Sam Hulcoop's unbeaten 100 v Guildford and Rebecca Denman's stunning burst of bowling taking 6-4 in the rout of Walton On Thames. Congratulations also to Rebecca for being selected for SE Stars Academy squad. An exciting but challenging season lies ahead this for the Women's section in the Premier league. Please support them whenever you can.

Thanks to our age group managers and Peter Edwards who work tirelessly and I suspect with little in the way of thanks to provide opportunities for our colts, boys and girls to play cricket. In 2022 we set a record for colts matches played and I'm pleased to report that we created a new record in 2023

We continued to invest in our facilities, the focus in 2023 being Holmwood Close where we installed a NTP, electronic digital scoreboard, two new sight screens and a practice batting cage. A new paved area with chairs moved from Cheam Road was created in front of the pavilion.

Thank you to the retiring Committee for another year of hard work . After many years service Chris Moore, who has relocated to Derbyshire, is standing down as Treasurer. We shall all miss you Mooro - especially your singing ! Also standing down is minutes secretary Adrian Noble , thanks Adrian for your contribution to the smooth running of Committee.

Our grounds were once more carefully tended by the team of Mark Povah John Fry and Rehan. Preparing wickets is a thankless task in the UK given our weather and particularly at Cheam Road where the slope from club house to north eastern corner makes it near on impossible to stop torrential run from seeping under the covers at the Nets end. That being said the wickets and outfields at Cheam Road and Holmwood Close were of a very high standard all summer .

In the club survey members wanted to see improvements in communications within the club and in the wider community. Mike Woods grasped this with both hands, members now receive regular updates and bulletins advising of what is going on throughout the year with plans for weekly player performance updates coming soon. Highlights were the Telsa Media T20 cup and Christmas market. Plans are being formulated for a repeat of both in 2024. This years report contains more financial details than usual including a commentary from Krishna who has been working tirelessly behind the scenes with our accountants Alexander James and new book keepers Hudson Fox to provide more details for members as well as managing a transfer from Sage to Zero. Sam Seadon's Saturday 1st XI Report

Having been comprehensively relegated from the Premier Division in 2022 and having lost a number of players for various reasons, we set about rebuilding a team to compete in Division One in 2023.

It is therefore a great credit to the old and new players who came together in summer 2023 that we were narrowly promoted back to the Premier Division at the end of the 2023 season.

The season started with lots of rain and very little opportunity for the new team to get together prior to the first league game, which was also washed out. After a loss to Walton in the second league game it was looking like it might take a few seasons for the new team to integrate and be successful.

However comfortable wins against Spencer and Camberley followed. A loss to Malden, after declaring with 300 on the board, set us back again.

More wins followed but we struggled to be consistent and weather continued to intervene. Bowling Banstead out for 99 and winning by nine wickets was a highlight. A low scoring penultimate game against Valley End went down to the last wicket. An heroic batting performance by seam bowling all-rounder Connor Griffin gave Sutton the win and promotion back to the Premier Division when other results went our way. Two key players stood out in 2023:

Fabian Cowdrey with 433 runs at 54 and 23 wickets at 10 and newcomer Cameron Tanner with 702 runs at 50. We are delighted to have both of them back for our Premier Division campaign in 2024.

Josh Blake, when not piling on the runs for Surrey 2s or on television for the T20 team, also scored valuable runs including a magnificent century at Malden Wanderers. Rehan Ratnasapabathy is well capable of improving in 2024 on his 2023 return at the top of the order.

New signing George Jackson got 21 wickets at 22, often bowling with hostility and getting the ball to swing.

Further new signing Harry Gardner and also stalwart Aneesh Jhalla picked up valuable wickets when available. It was also exciting to see Sahil Sheth have a run in the side, standing in for Aneesh's unexpected absence and picking up 8 wickets at 21, marking himself out as an outstanding future prospect.

It was great to have Surrey pro Conor Mckerr

in the team more regularly and a pleasure to watch such high quality fast bowling, we hope to see more of Conor in 2024.

The club is sad to lose Chris Morris who is taking up a playing and coaching role at Old Wimbledonians. Chris has made a huge contribution both on and off the field for both first and second teams over the years and we wish him the best.

Also Dan Edwards will be taking a break from the first team wicket keeping role to captain the second team in their attempt at promotion in 2024, taking over from Jamie Griffin's long-standing service to the club.

The club has strength in depth with players of the quality of Ansh Bansal, Dan Peall, Jay Evemy and Etinder Bopara also playing their part.

As we look forward to the 2024 season we have been recruiting again. The club survey, completed in late 2022 after the disappointments of that season, clearly indicated a desire from members to target Premier Division status for the Men's top 3 Saturday teams and the Women's team. There was also clear support from the club to employ paid professional players if they also contribute outside of playing cricket. To this end we have recruited Chris Swanson, a batter and seam bowler from New Zealand with lots of captaincy experience. Chris has relocated to Clapham having played for Northern Districts in NZ and last year playing as overseas for Harpenden in the Hertfordshire League.

We have also signed a top quality Australian state opening batsman who we expect, subject to visa application, to be with us from April until mid-August.

In addition we expect to have a new 1st XI wicket keeper, Joel Walker, who joins us from Chipstead (where he was captain) and will give us continuity throughout the season with Dan leading the twos and Josh often with Surrey.

We continue to look for other recruits and hope to see some returning familiar faces for 2024.

We also intend to look again at the structure of training and the development of young players in adult cricket as part of preparations for the season.

Having played at the club, on and off, since 1989 I have observed many different regimes in the senior teams. In my view finding the

right balance between professionals, club players and developing players is key. Sutton has a long tradition of being a top tier Surrey club, developing players into the professional game and being a place that people thoroughly enjoy playing. We will continue to strive to keep it that way.

I am more than happy to talk through our plans with members and thank the Chairman and the Committee for their support and hard work during this period of squad rebuilding. Also a particular thanks to Mike Woods for his commitment to the team in many ways throughout the season, we are lucky to have one of the best scorers around as we go back into the Prem.

We look forward to seeing you all during the 2024 season.

Jamie Griffin's Saturday 2nd XI Report

Despite handing in my captaincy resignation the day after last season ended, I found myself back for year number seven as captain. After a heartbreaking relegation by one point last season, we were back in Division One with a loaded side to start the season. Unfortunately, rain washed out our first game, and a weaker side were smashed at Weybridge the following week. We got off the mark in week three with a crushing victory against Cranleigh. We reduced them to 60-6 thanks to Sam Griffin's 5-33, and despite Cranleigh eventually making 206, Chris Morris smashed 117* to helped us chase the target in 35 overs. We rounded out May with a four wicket win over Camberley, with a superb team batting effort.

June brought the first 100 game of the season against Normandy. We had Normandy 8-2 early on, but we were dominated from their to the end. There was a superb rearguard effort from Sahil Sheth (34* off 59 from number 9), but we were bowled out with 11 balls to spare. We smashed a woeful Old Whits side the following week by eight wickets, but followed that up with a woeful effort of our own against Valley End at home. We were inserted on a decent Cheam Road deck, and somehow found ourselves 43-8. Ben Moncreiffe made a calm 33 from number 7, whilst Callum Noonan (22) and Sam Griffin (27*) provided some remarkable runs from numbers 10 and 11. We worked our way up to 115 before Ben was bowled, stranding Sam just short of a maiden hundred. We thought we had a chance thanks to Sam striking second ball of the Valley End innings, but they found their way to their target in tremendously boring fashion, refusing to even go after my first league over since 2013.

Our stop start season continued with another defeat at Banstead. Sam Griffin and Callum Noonan put up a Herculean effort on a sweltering day - Sam taking 5-55 in 14 overs and Callum taking 3-42 in 13 overs - but Banstead still managed to score 242. We put up another disgraceful effort with the bat, falling to 144 all out with all 10 batsman caught despite going for a draw from a long way out. We ended the skid the following week against Old Ruts thanks to a strong bowling effort and 73 from Dan Peall. Three draws and two abandoned games halted any momentum we found in the middle of the season. Aarav Rajnikanth made 70 and 68 in back to back weeks against Walton and Weybridge, but we failed to bowl both sides out in reduced over games.

This left us needing to win our last four 50 over games of the season, as well as needing help from elsewhere. We won the first three, with George Duckworth firstly making a wonderful 63* against Old Ruts after being 6 down, followed by 53 away at Valley End Valley End. We crushed Banstead the penultimate week of the season (J Griffin 70*), but fell 20 short of making it four in a row against Old Ruts in a game that ultimately didn't matter.

In the end, we finished fourth, 33 points off of the promotion places. We showed strong moments, but just couldn't string together enough performances with the bat to find ourselves in the hunt. Sam Griffin topped the bowling charts with 18 wickets @ 16.44 and Aarav Rajnikanth topped the batting charts with 311 runs @ 23.92. Thanks to Dave Evemy, Phil Diaper, Nick Cates for umpiring and Chris Clapham and Sharad Srivastav for scoring.

I truly mean it this time when I say I am standing down from the second team captaincy after this season. It's been a great seven years with promotions and relegations, but now is the right time to stand down. Best of luck to whoever skippers next season, I hope we get back to the Prem!

IF ONLY THE SEASON ENDED AS WELL AS IT STARTED

Sutton vs Spencer

To commence the Trust season, Sutton's first opponent was against a young Spencer side that in previous years have proved being very hard to beat. Sutton won the toss and elected to bat first, looking to pile on a big first innings total. Thanks to Daniel Edwards' (77 off 91), Cameron Tanner (36 off 36), Sahil Sheth (28 off 27) and Harry Gardner (25 off 34), Sutton managed to put a competitive 223 runs on the board off 40 overs. Spencer in reply were bowled out for 167 in 36.4 overs, thanks to Sahil Sheth (4 for 34 in 8 overs) and Harry Gardner (3 for 15 in 6.4 overs), along with a good supporting cast of young pace bowlers in Callum Noonan and Oscar Arzente taking a wicket each at crucial moments. Overall, a good start to the season.

Sutton vs Ashtead

For Sutton's next challenge, they faced Ashtead. Sutton won the toss and elected to bat first, once again looking to put a competitive total on the board in the first innings. Due to the weather being extremely hot, the game was shortened to a 35 over game, with multiple drink breaks. With the heat being extremely warm, impressively Sutton got 249 on the board, thanks to Ansh Bansal (95 off 82), William Berrill (68 off 82) and Ahrujan Ragunathan (30 off 16). Ashtead in reply scored a competitive 199 in their 35 overs, and at various points gave Sutton quite a lot to think about during their innings, however, the young talented line up lead by Ardash Balan (3 for 23 in 7 overs) managed to keep the run rate low enough that Ashtead couldn't achieve chasing it down.

Trinity Mid-Whitgiftians vs Sutton

Sutton won the toss in their first away game of the season, again electing to bat first. Sutton posted 178 in their 40 overs, which was quite a good effort after a loss of early wickets. Thanks to Ahrujan Ragunathan (58 off 87), Daniel Edwards' (40 off 52) and Callum Noonan (31 off 28), Sutton were able to post a defendable target. Trinity Mid-Whitgiftians in reply scored a very valiant 160 all out in 37.4 overs, giving Sutton a real run for their money, and taking the game very deep. Thanks to Anuj Srivastav (3 for 24 in 8 overs), supported by Ardash Balan (2 for 15 in 5 overs) and Daniel Edwards (2 for 20 in 7 overs), Sutton were always in the game, picking up wickets at crucial moments. Sutton had Trinity Mid-Whitgiftians 132 for 9, but a 28-run partnership for the last wicket really started



to put Sutton under pressure, but the last wicket came with a great sense of relief when Captain Rehan Ratna took the 10th wicket, with a very skilled stumping by young Nathan Bentley under pressure. A very entertaining game.

Sutton vs Banstead

The friendly rivalry of Sutton and Banstead had come round again for another year. Sutton once again won the toss and elected to bat first. It all looked very good and going according to plan when Sutton were 179 for 5 in 35 overs, with Daniel Edwards and Ahrujan Ragunathan getting scores of 30+, along with Harry Gardner, Krishna Rackal and Aarav Rajnikanth getting into the 20s. Therefore, there were a lot of players getting in but unfortunately not kicking onto bigger scores. Unfortunately, Sutton collapsed to 185 all out, which in the context of the game result was guite crucial. In reply, Banstead chased down 186 in 32.4 overs, 6 down, with good efforts from Harry Gardner and Callum Noonan attempting to keep Sutton in the game. Unfortunately, it wasn't enough, and Sutton missed an opportunity to put a bigger score on the board. Sutton must bounce back now to keep themselves in contention for the finals.

Oxted and Limpsfield vs Sutton

Sutton now faced an Oxted and Limpsfield side that defeated them last year in a very close game. Oxted and Limpsfield won the toss and elected to bat first, and after a decent start of 45 for no wicket, on came Harry Gardner (5 for 19 in 8 overs), supported by Rehan Ratna (2 for 32 in 8 overs), Oxted and Limpsfield for bowled out for 118. In reply, Sutton chased down 119 in a remarkable 17.2 overs, thanks to Cameron Tanner (61 off 31), with the supporting cast of William Berrill (19 off 33) and Aarav Rajnikanth (20 off 23). A very good dominant win that was required after the Banstead loss.

Sutton vs Reigate

In Sutton's next game, they faced an old nemesis Reigate, and Sutton won the toss and elected to bat first. After being 105 for 2, Sutton would have liked to have put a much more competitive score than they ended up with. Unfortunately, much like the Banstead game, Sutton collapsed to 143 all out in 36 overs. In reply, Reigate were under pressure from the beginning, with Connor Griffin (3 for 28 in 7.3 overs) leading the way, along with Anuj Srivastav (2 for 22 in 8 overs) and supported by Sahil Sheth and Harry Gardner,



Sutton were in the game having Reigate for 95 for 7. However, with not enough runs on the board and Reigate having enough time to chase the runs down, an 8th wicket partnership developed and along with Sutton not putting enough runs on the board, they also missed valuable opportunities to dismiss both batsmen for the 8th wicket via drop catches and a missed run-out. Reigate eventually chased down 146 in 38.3 overs thanks to that impressive 8th wicket partnership. Once again, due to mistakes with the bat and in the field at crucial times in the game, this was a real bad blow for Sutton in this season.

Wimbledon vs Sutton

Sutton faced Wimbledon in their next Trust game and Wimbledon won the toss, electing to bat. Wimbledon, after 30.4 overs had smashed Sutton around for 191 for the loss of 1 wicket. Luckily for Sutton, before it started getting out of hand, the rain intervened and cut short the game of play, further causing the game to be abandoned with the result being a draw.

Dulwich vs Sutton

For Sutton to stay in contention for a possible final spot, Sutton had to play a very talented Dulwich side who are currently sitting at the top of the table. With Sutton winning the toss and electing to bat first, they wouldn't have been impressed with being 43 for 5. However, thanks to Sam Seadon (72 off 92), who singlehandedly got Sutton to a possibly defendable total of 145 off 37.1 overs, unfortunately without a lot of support from other top order batsmen. In reply, Sutton knew that they would have to have a similar start as they did against Reigate, when defending a low total. Unfortunately, that did not come as Dulwich were 89 for 2, looking like they would easily chase down the total but with a tight spell of bowling from Callum Noonan (2 for 24 in 6 overs), Rehan Ratna (1 for 12 in 6 overs) and Chris Morris (2 for 21 in 5 overs), Sutton suddenly had Dulwich for 120 for 5, 26 runs away from victory. Unfortunately for Sutton, Dulwich had a 25run partnership when Sutton needed a couple of quick wickets to stay in the game, therefore chasing the total down in 36 overs. An unfortunate end to Sutton's hopes of reaching the finals.

Weybridge vs Sutton

Even though Sutton did not make the finals, they had earnt a place in the plate final vs Weybridge. The game was shortened to a 30 over game due to an event being held at the cricket club. Weybridge won the toss and elected to bat first, with Sutton initially looking quite confident having Weybridge 89 for 6, thanks to Rehan Ratna (3 for 35 in 6 overs) and Callum Noonan (2 for 25 in 5



overs), but unfortunately due to some very powerful lower order batting, Weybridge got to 204 for the loss of 9 wickets in 30 overs. In reply, Sutton got off to a rocketing start in a 69-run partnership, courtesy of George Duckworth (46 off 43) and Aditya Ganguly (28 off 31). Once again, like earlier on in the season, Sutton lost quick wickets at crucial times. William Berrill and Rehan Ratna attempted a last-minute dip at an unlikely win, but unfortunately their decision to go aggressive was a bit too late, leaving Sutton 20 runs short but a valiant effort, nonetheless.

Summary

Overall, the 2023 Trust team season didn't have the success they initially set out for in winning the whole competition. However, with a first year Captain, a lot of promising young talent and some committed experienced players representing teams as high as the first team, this year's trust team, proved in every game whether they won or lost that the potential to win every game was right there in their hands, if capitalised on every key moment. I am very confident that this year's trust team will learn from the lessons from the 2023 season and mount a serious campaign to try to reach the goal of winning the whole competition in the 2024 season.


